1. CALL TO ORDER

5. BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES

5.1 Park Patrol

Deputy Chief Foster provided an update on the park patrol program as it will not be initiated in Stratford for 2020 due to the implications of COVID-19.

7. REPORTS

7.1 POLICE MONTHLY STATISTICS

Deputy Chief Foster reviewed the February, March and April 2020 police monthly statistics.

In response to Chair Winter's inquiry about the process for responding to a shop lifting complaint, Deputy Chief Foster confirmed that the police often receive the complaint after the fact and will utilize video surveillance to investigate.

In response to Chair Winter's inquiry about a potential increase in domestic calls for service, Deputy Chief Foster stated that has been an increase in this type of call for service during the pandemic.

In response to Doug Diplock's inquiry about the break and enter calls for service in March, Deputy Chief Foster confirmed that the calls for service were related to residential properties but could not confirm how many had occurred prior to the declaration of a state of emergency by the province.

In response to Mayor Strathdee's inquiry about the protocols for calls for service as the province in preparing for the recovery of the pandemic, Deputy Chief Foster stated that an officer will continue to be deployed to a desk position whereby the officer will respond to specific calls for service over the phone rather than directly in-person. Stratford Police Service are investigating online reporting options like those at other services within the area.

For instances when in-person contact is required, screening from the call centre will be completed prior to police arriving on the scene. The officer responding in-person will determine which personal protective equipment is required taking several variants into consideration.

Following the transportation of a person placed under arrest, the vehicle will undergo a decontamination process.

In response to Chair Winter's inquiry about a person being a large in St. Marys, Community Resources Officer Keating confirmed that the individual has been apprehended as of this morning.

7.2 CRIME STOPPERS REPORT

Chief Skinner reviewed the December 2019, January and March 2020 Crime Stoppers reports.

In response to Chair Winter's inquiry whether prostitution is prevalent in St. Marys, Chief Skinner confirmed that prostitution and human trafficking instances are occurring in the area however, the Crime Stoppers reports do not breakdown the tips into the two counties served other further into the specific municipality.

In response to Chair Winter's inquiry regarding tobacco tax enforcement, Chief Skinner stated contraband tobacco sales are an issue in the area which result in tax evasion investigation. Officers have been trained in tobacco enforcement and will follow up on these specific tips.

9. OTHER BUSINESS

9.1 Response to Pandemic

Chief Skinner provided a detailed overview of the Stratford Police Services' response to the pandemic.

Some of the highlights include:

- suspension of all external training
- suspension of auxiliary training program
- development of operation plan followed by various revisions
- consulted regarding court management process during pandemic
- tracking of COVID-19 related costs
- pandemic resulted in heightened stressors within the community and within the workplace and responded accordingly
- ongoing need to communicate clear and concise expectations of the public as provincial information could be misinterpreted
- criminal investigation and street crimes members were redeployed to assist with enhanced visibility on the streets and to reassure the public that police were present and available to respond to community needs
- public's initial response to the emergency orders significantly decreased the volume of calls for service however, there began an upward trend of speeding, domestic crime and mischief
- increased need to support individuals due to mental health triggers
- implemented voluntary health checks of all members attending work

 constant monitoring and purchasing to maintain enough inventory of personal protective equipment

9.2 Recovery Plan

Deputy Chief Foster presented SPS's approach to recovery planning for its members and the community.

Highlights from the recovery plan approach include:

- phased reintegration to the workplace for those members that have been working remotely during the pandemic with the first phase of members anticipated for return by June 1
- members that were redeployed to another unit in response to the pandemic will return to primary position
- preparedness to respond to the member's and community's needs as emergency orders are extended or lifted

In response to Doug Diplock's inquiry whether a health and safety audit has been conducted at the St. Marys office, Deputy Chief Foster stated that an audit has not been completed but will investigate further.

Brent Kittmer identified the ongoing struggle to interpret messaging from the province and the medical officer of health. As emergency orders are lifted, Mr. Kittmer inquired to what degree the SPS would be able to patrol recreation amenities as they reopen.

Chief Skinner stated that the police will monitor recreation amenities and respond to calls for service based on a priority sequence.

9.3 Impersonating Police

In response to Chair Winter's inquiry whether the act of impersonating a police officer was prevalent in St. Marys, Chief Skinner stated that the situation does exist across the province however, within the areas that SPS provides service, there are no known concerns at present.

10. UPCOMING MEETINGS

Chair Winter reviewed the upcoming meeting as presented on the agenda.

COVID Crime Stats

Message from Chief Greg Skinner;

The Stratford Police Service would like to thank the community for its overwhelming support in voluntarily following the Emergency Orders during the COVID-19 pandemic.

We recognize that this is new legislation to most, and that the instructions and expectations have changed rapidly as the response to the pandemic has evolved. That's why the Stratford Police Service took the position that we would enhance our community visibility in an effort to promote voluntary compliance with the Emergency Orders, and focus more on education and awareness before moving to enforcement where there was no voluntary compliance.

Stratford Police have responded to numerous Emergency Order complaints of violations, mostly relating to social distancing, congregating in groups greater than five, and non-emergency businesses remaining open. There have been even more requests for interpretations of the Emergency Order so that people could educate themselves on what was and was not allowed.

I am pleased to say that the level of voluntary compliance and the efforts people have made to keep each other safe has meant that Stratford Police have not had to take any enforcement action to date specific to contraventions of the Emergency Orders.

After having seen significant year-over-year increases in certain types of calls during the months of March and April (for example, mental health calls up 51%, domestic/family dispute calls up 18%, vandalism calls up 72%) the month of May has seen those trends begin to reverse. Mental health calls for service increased 19% over May of 2019, and drug-related arrests and seizures increased by almost 60%, compared to May of 2019. Property crime, which had seen a significant increase early in the pandemic, has decreased drastically, in part because of the work done by investigators to identify; arrest and charge offenders. Violent crime continues to trend downward with only assaults showing an increase from 11 reported in May 2019 to 21 reported this May. Motor vehicle collisions for the month were down by almost 50% from last May.
