Subject: PW 63-2020 Establishing a Wildflower Meadow in St. Marys

PURPOSE

To report back to the Green Committee regarding establishing a wildflower meadow in St. Marys. This report will discuss the steps to be undertaken, the cost to establish a meadow and possible locations.

RECOMMENDATION

THAT PW 63-2020 Establishing a Wildflower Meadow in St. Marys be received; and
THAT the Green Committee recommend to Council:
THAT Council approve the action to establish a wildflower meadow that is square meters and be located in St. Marys; and
THAT Council direct staff to pursue grant funding to fund the wildflower meadow project

BACKGROUND

A Green Committee member received an inquiry from the public regarding wildflowers. Considering establishing wildflower meadows in St. Marys falls within the Green Committee's mandate, under naturalization projects.

The Town's Recreation and Leisure Services Master Plan recommends and encourages the naturalization of municipal lands, including Town parks. The Town of St. Marys Council tasked the 2018-2022 Green Committee with recommending policies to establish natural areas and create strategies for maintaining natural areas. To date, the Green Committee has been focusing on the rehabilitation of Sparling Bush, an established natural area in St. Marys. The approach is to use Sparling Bush as a pilot area to determine best practices with respect to establishing and maintaining natural areas which can be incorporated into a naturalization plan. Establishing a wildflower meadow can complement the works being undertaken at Sparling Bush, as the primary focus has been towards woodlot management. Wildflower considerations should also be incorporated into a naturalization plan.

There are many benefits to establishing a wildflower area:

- A beautification method and amenity along the Town's trail network
- Support dwindling populations of native pollinators including butterflies, moths and bees, helping to sustain insects that pollinate food crops. This is particularly important in increasingly built up environments.
- Act as a habitat for various animals and insects including caterpillars, spiders, birds, frogs, newts, toads and other small animals.

This report will outline how to establish a wildflower meadow, the financial implications to establish the wildflower area, and possible locations.

REPORT

The Town of St. Marys does not have any established wildflower meadows. The Upper Thames River Conservation Authority has experience with wildflower meadows, there are meadows in Mitchell and at Wildwood Conservation Area. UTRCA has been consulted while preparing this report.

Planting

There are three methods for preparing the site:

- Chemical spray to kill the grass area;
- Skim a layer of sod with a tractor bucket then roto-till to loosen up the soil; or
- Roto-till (more possible for grass to grow which will require maintenance)
- Tarping with Geotextile fabric for several months in advance of the plant

Once the site has been prepared, the wildflowers can be planted. Wildflowers are planted in plug packages, a plug package includes a variety of wildflowers that include spring, summer and fall blooming flowers. An assortment of native flower species allows for all season blooming, and different flower heights (preventing weed growth). The plugs are planted 12 inches apart, approximately 10 plants per square meter. The plugs are ordered in November for a spring plant (like tree orders), there are nurseries in the area that can supply the plugs.

The time required to plant the wildflower meadow will vary depending on the size of the meadow and the number of volunteers planting the plugs. For context, the Mitchell wildflower meadow used 1400 plants (approx. 140 square metres), and with the assistance of a Grade 5 class of 28 students and 15 adults the meadow was planted in four hours. Approximately 350 plants were planted per hour.

A methodology for planting has not been included in this report as it is difficult to speculate what type of restrictions will be in place for Spring 2021. If the Committee and Council wish to proceed with establishing a wildflower meadow area, a plan can be developed closer to the planting date. Consideration should be given to a collaborative approach that includes Town staff, UTRCA representatives, local service clubs, students and the Green Committee.

Meadow Configuration and Costs

Town staff have created several conceptual configurations for discussion, please see **Attachment A – Meadow Configurations and Costs.** The attachment provides possible locations, configuration and size of the meadow, the cost of materials and supplies to plant the meadow and tentative planting timelines.

Please note that the configurations are adjacent to Sparling Bush, between the trail network. There is a Hydro One easement within that area, there is a chance that Hydro One will need to access that area and potentially position equipment in the meadow to do repairs.

The configurations are conceptual in nature and subject to change as a result of the Committee's discussion and recommendations.

The Town can apply for grant monies to fund the purchase of the plug packages. Establishing a wildflower meadow falls within the criteria for the TD Friends of the Environment Foundation Grant (TD FEF). The application period closes in January 2021, notice of decision is received in April 2021.

The Town needs to place an order with the nursery for the plug packages by mid-fall for a spring plant. As the Town will not know the funding source until spring 2021, staff are recommending that the materials and supplies cost not exceed \$5,000.00. The majority of approved TD FEF grants are

between \$2,000 and \$8,000. An amount of \$5,000.00 or less falls within the grant guidelines and can be absorbed within the operating budget should funding not be received.

A wildflower meadow that does not exceed \$5,000 in costs is approximately 165 square meters in size. A meadow of this size can act as pilot project before considering larger tracts of land. In the future, a phased in approach can be developed to accommodate a larger area.

Questions for the Green Committee

- 1. Which method should be used to prepare the site?
- 2. What site configuration does the Committee prefer? Is there a preferred location or size?

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Conceptual configurations were provided to the Committee, the costs were also included.

The materials and supplies cost per square meter are \$30.00 or \$33.50 per square meter if the tarping preparation method is used, the labour costs are unknown at this time however, the costs will be minimal and absorbed through existing operating budget and volunteer participation. Grant funding is available and should be pursued to cover the cost of the initiative.

SUMMARY

The Green Committee has been tasked with reviewing and considering naturalization projects. At previous meetings the Committee has discussed the feasibility of establishing a wildflower meadow. Staff have presented a report to the Committee regarding potential locations and costs for the Committee to discuss and make a recommendation to Council.

OPTION 1



Total Area = 654 sq m

Tarping Cost \$3.50/sq m x 654 = \$2289.00

Total Cost: \$21,909.00

Approx. 19 hours to plant

OPTION 2



Total Area = 545 sq m

Plug Packages 545 sq m x 10 = 5450 plugs 5450 plugs x \$3.00/plug = \$16,350

Tarping Costs \$3.50/sq m x 545 = \$1907.50

Total Cost: \$18,257.50

Approx. 16 hours to plant

OPTION 4

Plug Package Costs 125 x 10 = 1250 1250 x \$3.00/plug = \$3750.00

Tarping Costs \$3.50/sq m x 125 = \$437.50

Total Cost: \$4187.50 + HST

Approx. 4 hours to plant
