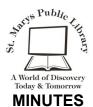

Building Strong Community

Diverse and Accessible Library Collections

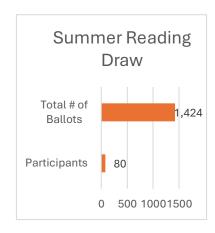

Fun and Inclusive Programs and Services

New public computers have been ordered for the Library. They will roll out later this month. This is as a result of the challenges presented by the Windows 11 upgrade. It is the intent of Library and IT staff that there will be minimal disruption to computer services at that time.

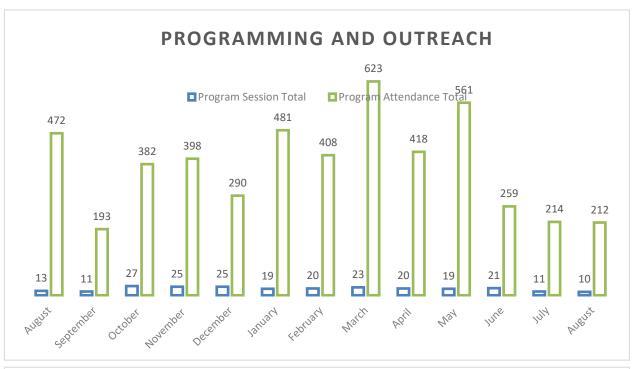

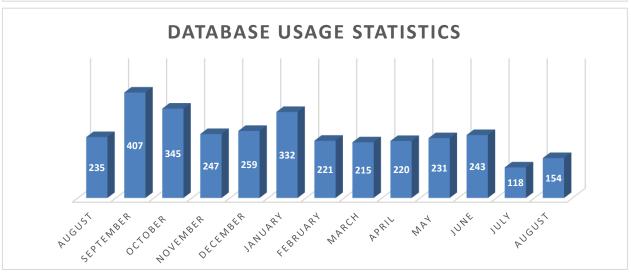

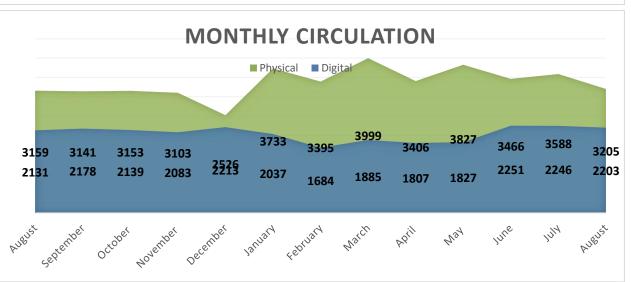

DEPARTMENTAL HIGHLIGHTS

Learners

Since our last update, we have welcomed four additional independent learners into the program. We are also in the early stages of planning a financial literacy group session in partnership with The Local, which is scheduled to run later this fall. As we have noted in past updates, these group sessions serve two important purposes: they provide a meaningful introduction to our program for new learners, and they also support us in meeting the ministry's mandated participation targets.

Computer Replacements

In our last report to the board, we shared that a funding request had been submitted for updated computer equipment. The Ministry of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development recently distributed a survey to Literacy and Basic Skills service providers, acknowledging that the transition to Windows 11 could create challenges for existing technology. For the Adult Learning Program of Perth, this shift will render all of our current desktop and laptop computers obsolete. With assistance from the Town's IT Department, we prepared and submitted a request for eight new laptops, totaling \$11,000. At this stage, we are still awaiting a response regarding our application.

While we are hopeful that funding will be approved, there have been early discussions about the possibility of requesting that funds be temporarily drawn from reserve to allow us to move ahead with these purchases. Doing so would ensure that we are able to continue supporting learners without interruption. Should this external funding later be secured, the reserve could then be reimbursed in full.

At present, we will continue to wait for the Ministry's decision. However, depending on the outcome and the urgency of our technology needs, we may return to the board with a formal request to proceed with using reserve funds to cover these costs in the interim.

SPENDING AND VARIANCE ANALYSIS

Contingency funding for new computers if funding is not forthcoming from the Ministry totaling \$11, 000. This funding would come from the Adult Learning funds currently held in reserve.

BACKGROUND

The Four Year Governance Cycle outlined by the Ontario Library Service (OLS) is organized around a life cycle for public library boards, aligned with Ontario's 4-year board and council terms. It is designed to offer boards suggestions large strategic tasks to complete during a board's term. A balanced plan should consider the board's education needs as well as the scheduling of tasks to meet the intended goals of the board.

REPORT & ANALYSIS

The Library Board is about to complete Year Three and move into Year Four of the board cycle, The governance cycle proposes a focus on planning and assessment in the third year of a library board's term. However, many of the planning and assessment activities discussed in this guide should be undertaken on an ongoing basis throughout the four-year board term.

A key role of the library board is defining the library's purpose and direction and assessing its effectiveness in providing services to the community. Section 20(a) of the Public Libraries Act directs a public library board to provide "comprehensive and efficient public library service" that reflects the community's needs. The board's role in the planning and assessment process, first and foremost, is to ensure that planning and assessment take place at the board table. The St. Marys Public Library board is progressing well with accomplishing the goals of Year Three as outlined, with the following milestones begun or completed already.

The Town of St. Marys is advancing the 14 Church St. project to the next developmental stage. This project will provide the Library additional spaces to provide programs and services to the community. There will be capital costs associated with this project which the Library Board needs to prepare for.

BACKGROUND

The Downtown Service Location review project kicked off in 2023 with a goal of determining how the Town could efficiently deliver various services in and around the downtown core. With the passage of time, and various Council decisions, the project now solely focuses on how the Town will use 14 Church Street North.

Since December 18, 2024, the project consultant, DSLR Committee and staff have refined a space needs review into a draft design concept for 14 Church Street. The design concept has been reviewed by the DSLR Committee and has been recommended to be presented to Council so that it can be finalized and adopted.

Council has also asked staff to develop a concept operating plan (programming schedule + operating budget) for the use of 14 Church Street. The project consultant and staff have developed a conceptual "Day 1" programming schedule and operating budget for 14 Church Street for Council's information.

At the August 26 meeting, the project consultants (A+Link Architecture and Angela Brayham) and staff presented all project materials to Council for consideration.

Council approved the master plan for 14 Church Street be adopted by Council; and staff were directed to begin seeking capital construction grants for the 14 Church Street community hub project.

REPORT & ANALYSIS

The creation of a Fundraising Advisement Ad-HOC Committee will help shape the development of a capital campaign to support the 14 Church St. project and demonstrate community support for this project.

CONCLUSION

Staff recommend creating a Library Board AD-HOC Fundraising Advisory Committee. Staff recommend that the Library Board create an AD-HOC committee comprised of Library Board members, Friends of the Library representatives and Town liaisons to craft an approach to fundraising for future growth opportunities at 14 Church St. Fundraising will be an important component of this project to demonstrate town support and commitment to this project.
